During our latest fiscal year ending June 2022, our Foundation faced new challenges following the COVID 19 pandemic. Our 2022 FY annual summer planning retreat was held in person and by ZOOM in July of 2021 in Burlington, Vt. Board meetings and the Annual meeting were held by virtual ZOOM calls instead of in person. Our FY 2023 meeting and Annual meeting has been held in person in Dallas, TX during July of 2022. Our Dallas meeting allowed us to review Grants and Scholarship procedures to better focus on improving our approval process while also staying very close to our mission statement. We also plan to return to the Fremont report we commissioned pre COVID and hope to plan ahead for the next several years. .

Our annual Celebration event held in the Fort Lauderdale area was again held in Wilton Manors during March. Financially it was very successful. Guests were glad to have the chance to get together on a personal basis as well as enjoying the hospitality of the city owned Richardson Mansion.

Based on the financial condition of the year end we have committed to a total of \$300,000 for the 2023 fiscal year, which is already in the distribution process. As you will read in the reports for grants and scholarships, the total award level for fiscal 2022 was \$400,000.

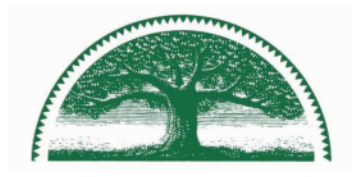
Also, please note that for the second year we have maintained the amount of "Named" scholarships to \$5000 and have raised the available level of grant awards to \$15,000.

2022 GRANTS AWARDS

Total grants - \$252,900

Preface from the Grants Director, Peter Harvey

The applications that we received for the 2021-2022 Grants year were submitted in March 2021 in the middle of the Covid-19 pandemic. The pandemic has changed the operational landscape of how most of the non-profits operate causing them to pivot from one-on-one medical counseling to using on-line telehealth services, and group zoom meetings replaced community activities that were abandoned when physical resource centers had to close and implement physical distancing etc. Many staff members were working from home and some organizations were able to score government funding from the large pandemic Payroll Protection Programs (PPP) to sustain their employee base.

We received 64 qualifying applications requesting \$771,215. Of those, 35 of the applications were from new Organizations that have never applied to the Foundation before. We awarded 29 grants totaling \$252,900 - the most we have ever awarded in a year. By category of grants, we awarded \$43,400 to 6 Organizations for HIV/AIDS services programs; \$151,400 to 17 Organizations for community services initiatives; and \$58,100 to six Organizations for research and public education in support of LGBT equality and acceptance. Selections were based on a review of all applications by the 10 members of the Grants Committee; recommendations were approved by the Gamma Mu Foundation's Board of Directors in June 2021.

Thanks to you all for your generous donations and support that allows the Foundation to fund so many deserving LGBTQIA non-profits helping thousands of clients in our community across rural and underserved America every day. I also want to thank the members of the Grants committee for their time and effort they put into reviewing and scoring the applications. The grants we chose to make could not have been decided without the hours and the work they put in during April 2021.

HIV/AIDS Services

AIDS Support Group of Cape Cod, ,Provincetown,Ma

\$4,700.00

With the support of the Gamma Mu Foundation, the Drop-in Center expands r services to extend beyond our health mandate and serve as a kind of LGBTQ+ community center even while we continue to reach out and provide sexual health services to all. As the Drop-In Center evolves, we believe we will more effectively advance our mission and better serve the breadth and depth of the LBGTQ+ community that visits and lives in Provincetown.

Cascade AIDS Project, Portland, OR

\$5,700.00

With support from Gamma Mu Foundation, Cascade AIDS Project (CAP) is partnering with Rainbow Advocacy Inclusion & Networking Services (RAINS) to start a social support group for LGBTQ+ people living with HIV in the pre-dominantly rural county of Cowlitz in Southwest Washington. We envision a partnership that will strengthen both of these organizations and improve the critically important social-safety networks available to HIV-positive and LGBTQ+ people living in rural SW Washington.

Legacy Counseling Center, Dallas,TX

\$8,000.00

Your funding supports the telehealth maintenance and expansion. This project's main goals are to increase the accessibility of our expert-level care, increase the number of GLBT clients served in rural areas, and ultimately decrease the spread of HIV/AIDS through support, information and education. A team composed of Legacy employees and administrative assistants implemented the platform, pivoting within two weeks of the lockdown in 2020 to serve our clients remotely.

Utah AIDS Foundation, Salt Lake City, Ut

\$6,000.00

The Utah AIDS Foundation grant is for our HIV & STI Prevention Education and Testing Programs targeted to men who have sex with men – the population at highest risk for HIV infection in Utah. Despite decades of decline in the rate of HIV infection, nationwide, rates of new HIV infections continue at a steady rate in Utah, and rates of other STI are at 10-year highs – this is due to a combination of factors, including a conservative social, political, and religious landscape that discourages education and conversations about sexual health and does not prioritize the funding of effective HIV and STI testing and prevention strategies targeted to men who have sex with men, the state's population at highest risk for HIV.

Vermont Cares, Burlington, VT**\$12,500.00**

The grant for Vermont CARES is to help us enhance HIV prevention in rural Vermont. One year into living with COVID-19, we anticipate an upcoming season of ambitious HIV testing in response to unmet need from the last year. Access to HIV testing in Vermont was severely curtailed in 2020 because of State mandates limiting in-person healthcare, and we are optimistic that come autumn 2021 we will be allowed to again serve Vermonters with dynamic in-person HIV testing service

World AIDS Museum and Educational Center, Ft Lauderdale, FL 6,500.00

On the 40th Anniversary of the AIDS Epidemic, the World AIDS Museum and Educational Center believes that we must learn from the history of this disease to make a difference in the present and future of Florida. COVID-19 forced us to convert most of our exhibits, programming, and educational trainings to online content. We noted that for the first time we were reaching those in rural communities who only needed access to the internet to take part in our trainings and programming. This was very exciting and our Board saw this as an opportunity to increase our reach into rural areas throughout Florida. Our demonstration project, Fighting HIV/AIDS Stigma in Rural Florida, will have interns from rural areas working to identify and develop programming with other local community service providers. These partnerships will connect rural LGBTQ+ communities (Panhandle, North Florida, and South-Central Florida) with programs previously only offered in South Florida.

Community Services**Asylum Connect New York, NY****\$9800.00**

AsylumConnect is providing the world's first and only tech resource platform designed to facilitate the safe navigation of LGBTQ+ people fleeing persecution. We use technology to instantly match LGBTQ+ people fleeing persecution with the independently verified safe legal, medical, mental health and social services that can help. This project will bring the free AsylumConnect platform to 11 new rural states (Oklahoma, Kansas, Iowa, South Dakota, Utah, Nevada, Montana, Wyoming, Alaska, Tennessee, and South Carolina)

during 2021 in order to serve thousands more vulnerable LGBTQ+ people in rural and under-served communities across America.

Campus Pride, Charlotte, NC **\$7,200.00**

Campus Pride was not able to offer Camp Pride in-person the last two years. Instead, we had to do an online hybrid event and find innovative ways to substitute Camp Pride and provide meaningful engagement for LGBTQ youth. Camp Pride 2022 will be the much-anticipated return with our 16th annual Camp Pride. We are looking to move Camp Pride from North Carolina to Florida. It will be hosted either on the campus of University of Central Florida or University of North Florida. The educational program promotes progressive critical thinking and leadership concepts built on a foundation of social justice and civility. Camp Pride has a proven history of transforming students into change agents on their campus through our leadership development, social justice education and action planning curriculum.

Four Corners Rainbow Youth Center, Durango, CO **\$11,000.00**

The Gamma Mu 50th Anniversary Award

During the 2014-2015 school year, LGBTQ youth approached the founders and voiced concern and need for a space they can attend after and outside of school that will accept them for who they are and assist in their growth and healthy development. Our goal was to create a space that was peer-led, where our actions would be inspired and directed by youth voice, and to empower those voices to higher levels of discourse. And we have done just that. We continue to be youth inspired, run ideas and create programming with the youth and our Youth Leadership Team. We believe that peer to peer influence and connection has the most significant impact and we encourage positive leadership and role modeling.

FREE2LUV, Seattle, WA **\$7,700.00**

COVID-19 forced us into social isolation. For some LGBTQ+ youth, this has caused heightened mental health issues, concerns for safety if their home environment is not supportive, and isolation from friends and the LGBTQ+ community often a safe haven in their daily lives. In response, Free2Luv brought their empowerment programming virtual, and created a new program, EXPRESS IT!, to raise the voices of LGBTQ+ youth and provide a safe space for them to nurture their mental well-being, increase self-awareness,

and share their innermost thoughts, experiences, and perspectives with each other and the community at large through art. The EXPRESS IT! program is an interactive after-school program for LGBTQ+ youth ages 10 – 18 serving rural communities, specifically in West Virginia and North Carolina.

Wyoming Equality, Cheyenne, WY **\$11,400.00**

Wyoming Equality has started the Wyoming GSA Network, which seeks to educate, empower, and organize young LGBTQ students across the state of Wyoming. We provide financial and technical support to existing GSAs, help to create new GSAs, and work to connect all Wyoming GSAs with events that foster leadership skills. Gamma Mu funds will help us to continue to provide on-site visits and financial support to students who face hostility from their classmates, administration, and elected officials, but who find resources to foster resilience and self-esteem in their GSA clubs and in their connections made with GSAs across the state.

Green Mountain Crossroads, Brattleboro, VT **\$10,300.00**

Out in the Open is seeking to deepen our connection with and support of our rural LGBTQ community members who are experiencing isolation, lack of community connection, and a scarcity of resources that are well-documented to lead to harmful outcomes. The Rural Queer Community Care Network will identify rural LGBTQ community members needing support and mail them intentionally-crafted care packages, interactive art projects, and written notes through the Care Package Initiative. OITO has successfully sent about 134 care packages for varying needs in three rounds since June 2020, but the demand from our rural LGBTQ network is far greater than our current funding available.

In Our Own Voices, Inc., Albany, NY **\$10,500.00**

The Jones Kahle Award IHO Martin Culbreth In Our Own Voices, Inc. (IOOV) Supporting Our Seniors (SOS) Program. The LGBTQ 55+ Supporting Our Seniors (S.O.S) Program was formed by the very community it is focused on serving - the over 55- to provide low- and moderate-income LGB TGNCQ Seniors (aged 55+) with access to educational, recreational, health & wellness, and peer support opportunities through a series of workshops, wellness assistance, and provision of technological opportunities to reduce social

isolation, increase the quality of life, and reduce negative physical, mental, economic, spiritual, and cultural outcomes often associated within a very underserved population.

LGBT Center of Central Pennsylvania, Harrisburg, PA

\$6,900.00

LGBTQ+ youth experience unique challenges in Central PA, so strengthening services for our young people is critical. While the LGBT Center provides a broad range of programs, we are best known for our youth program. Founded in 1993, Common Roads started as a weekly safe space when there were no resources for LGBTQ+ youth available. The LGBT Center will continue offering three weekly Common Roads groups for LGBTQ+ youth, as well as continued engagement with schools across Central PA. Due to COVID-19 all of our weekly groups are being offered virtually as we continue to provide vital support to our young people, and we look forward to being able to resume in-person programs when it is safe to do so.

Love Must Win, Inc., Newport, KY

\$10,200.00

Lawrenceburg, Indiana will be holding its 5th annual Pride parade and festival on Sunday, June 12th, 2022 at the Dearborn County Fairgrounds. Our goal to have 10,000 or more in attendance for this CELEBRATION of Pride and LOVE! In 2018 and 2019 we had roughly 1000-1500 participants each year from all over the tristate area with hopes to double attendance this year. This event was created to help give visibility to and empower youth and adults in this rural community in hopes to help alleviate some of the higher hurdles that the LGBTQ+ community faces on a day-to-day basis. Our hope is to help decrease bullying, discrimination, suicide rates, addiction, mental health issues, and self-destructive behaviors- ALL of which sadly have a much higher rate in the LGBTQ+ community.

OutCenter of Southwest Michigan, Benton Harbor, MI

\$10,200.00

The LGBTQ+ Safe Schools Collaborative was established in July 2018 with a three-year commitment of funds from United Way of Southwest Michigan. It is by far the largest and most successful initiative in the history of the OutCenter of Southwest Michigan. United Way extended \$30,000 of project support for a fourth year and the total cost is \$61,630. We are seeking funding from the Gamma Mu Foundation during the 4th year to help meet the needs of the program and diversify funds to include support from a national source.

Utah LGBTQ+ Chamber of Commerce, Salt Lake City, Ut \$5,100.00

The Utah LGBTQ+ Chamber of Commerce requests funding to re-launch and expand its SafeZone Utah program. The SafeZone program, which is part of the larger Utah LGBTQ+ Chamber of Commerce, works to increase local business owners' understanding of experiences and issues faced by the LGBTQ+ community, and educate them about how to create safe, inclusive spaces for LGBTQ+ employees and community members. Business that choose to become designated LGBTQ+ SafeZones serve as visible, safe physical spaces for LGBTQ+ individuals to drop in, connect with resources, and do business.

West Virginia Gay & Lesbian Community Center, Beckley, WV \$11,200.00

This project identifies needs and provides an initial range of services to the LGBTQIA+ community in an eight-county area of southern West Virginia. We have already identified several needs in our community that we will address with this grant. We will run a monthly transportation program to LGBTQIA+ supportive providers, with an emphasis on Endocrinologists, from the center to Charleston, WV. We will run a program that provides emergency transportation from remote areas to the center and provide short-term (five days) emergency housing to allow time and space for other community resources to be activated. We will establish the center as a gathering space that provides movies, music, and other social activities for members of the LGBTQIA community.

Pride and Joy Foundation, Queen Creek, AZ \$6,300.00

The Vanden Heuvel and Greeson Grant Award

Ask. Listen. Plan. (ALP) is the Pride and Joy Foundation's signature Suicide Risk Awareness and Prevention educational program. ALP workshops are offered to LGBTQ+ college-aged participants designed to educate and empower them with the knowledge and skills to intervene for someone experiencing suicidal thoughts. We target colleges and universities with underserved and struggling LGBTQ+ resource centers. In this 90-minute, interactive workshop, students learn significant suicide risk factors, questions they can ask to break the ice, active and focused listening skills, and a planning-framework to help themselves or their friends.

Pride Link, Greenville, SC**\$5,100.00**

The LGBTQ community in Upstate, SC has an uphill battle when it comes to achieving positive health outcomes. Funding from Gamma Mu will be used to support our Health and Wellness Project (HWP). The HWP will offer a safe space for LGBTQ people of all ages to access free affirming medical, mental health, and other health related services on site in a permanent physical space. Pride Link's HWP will partner with organizations and providers who will deliver their services such as medical screening, therapy sessions, HIV testing, health education, and on site at our Community Wellness Center.

Queer Asterisk, Boulder, CO**\$10,400.00**

The Rural LGBTQ+ Tele-Mental Health Initiative Program is an expansion of the program that was funded by Gamma Mu in 2020, providing LGBTQ+ folks in rural areas with access to low-cost or no-cost professional mental health counseling and peer mentorship delivered by LGBTQIA counselors and providers as a pilot program over a period of six months. Because of the move to online services, we will now also be providing our community services

Stonewall Alliance of Chico, Chico, CA**\$7,900.00**

We provide direct mental health services to members of the LGBTQ+ community, their parents, families, partners, and children. All our counselors are volunteer trainees supervised by a licensed clinician, with everyone receiving extensive training on working with the LGBTQ+ community. We make direct referrals and coordinate care with other agencies when our clients receive services from multiple providers. Several recent natural disasters left many we serve from neighboring communities of Paradise and Berry Creek with new trauma to address, including near-death experiences, loss of housing, loss of loved ones and animals, loss of employment, and the ongoing stress of finding a new normal after a life altering event like a natural disaster. Gamma Mu Foundation funding will help support our ongoing services.

Triangle Area Network, Inc., Beaumont, TX**\$10,200.00**

For so many in our community, accessing basic health care and supportive services can be challenging. The GLBT Community faces additional challenges to accessing medical services and care, especially in rural areas. TAN Healthcare has served the GLBT Community for over 30 years, starting out in 1987 as an AIDS Service Organization in rural Southeast Texas

to today, serving an expanded community through our designation as a Federally Qualified Health Center in 2016. TAN Healthcare remains a key community resource for HIV testing, prevention services and treatment. Our program, Pathways to Care is specifically committed to the outreach and service to the GLBT community in Southeast Texas.

Research and Public Education

Truth Wins Out, Philadelphia, PA

\$12,000

In 2020, Truth Wins Out released historic, in-depth interviews with former “ex-gay” leaders, who told the world that conversion programs are dangerous. Truth Wins Out needs your help to distribute the interviews, so people can understand the full wreckage wrought by the “ex-gay” industry. We will also continue to tell the stories of “ex-gay” survivors, whose experiences are instrumental in defeating the “ex-gay” Big Lie. Truth Wins Out will continue to monitor and report on every aspect of the “ex-gay” industry. We will work to expose their leaders as frauds, and fight against lies and defamation and provide world class resources to help people avoid these noxious programs. We will continue our work speaking to the media, educating the public through various interviews. Additionally, we will host online seminars to help people understand the danger these groups represent.

Mississippi Safe Schools Coalition, Jackson MS

\$11,600.00

The Richard Karpawich Award for Research and Education

To reduce bullying and discrimination of LGBTQ students in Mississippi public schools and expand access to LGBTQ inclusive curricula, the Mississippi Safe Schools Coalition seeks to expand its professional learning engagement (PLE) program through the development of the Be the Change Institute (BCI). The BCI is an eight week program that prepares education practitioners to implement evidence-based strategies that create and promote safe and inclusive learning environments for LGBTQ students. Mississippi is one of 30 states without laws prohibiting discrimination against students based on both sexual orientation and gender identity and without comprehensive statewide policies on treatment of transgender, nonbinary and gender non-conforming students.

Safe Schools South Florida, Fort Lauderdale, FL**\$11,100**

Our primary activity is the Safe Schools Project. The project employs certified educators to provide school administrators, teachers, guidance counselors, and paraprofessionals with training on strategies, techniques, and resources for making schools and classrooms safe learning environments for all students, with a particular emphasis on LGBTQ youth. The project also targets secondary school students interested in adult-facilitated youth leadership activities.

New Mexico Community AIDS Partnership, Santa Fe, NM**\$6,800**

We are requesting support from the Gamma Mu Foundation for our 2021 New Mexico Sexual and Gender Minority Health Summit. The six summits that NMCAP has held with our partners in previous years have been extremely successful. We have attracted broad-based participation from researchers, medical and behavioral health providers, public health professionals, community advocates and members of the LGBTQ+ communities of New Mexico. The 2021 summit presents a significant opportunity to build on previous work to increase health equity and improve health and well-being for all LGBTQ+ New Mexicans, with a focus on those who live in small towns and rural areas and those for whom the stigma and marginalization of an LGBTQ+ identity are compounded by other stigmatized identities based on race and ethnicity, ability, education, socio economic group, etc.

LGBTQ+ Allies Lake County, Painesville, OH**\$10,000**

LGBTQ+ Allies Lake County wants to offer businesses, organizations, and schools the opportunity to take a free 2-hour Safe Space Training. The Safe Space Training is designed to promote a welcoming, safe, and inclusive environment for all members of the LGBTQ+ community. The training gives attendees the opportunity to learn about LGBTQ+ identities, gender, sexuality, prejudice, assumptions, and privilege. This 2-hour workshop will also give attendees better awareness and understanding of the LGBTQ+ community, and how they can be an effective ally.

Family Counseling Service of the Finger Lakes, Geneva, NY \$6,600

Family Counseling Service of the Finger Lakes, Inc. provides community outreach education and support to lesbian, gay, bi-sexual, transgender and queer/questioning community in our four county service area in upstate NY that includes Ontario, Wayne, Seneca and Yates counties. The LGBTQ Program provides social, emotional, and educational support to adults and youth who identify as LGBTQ+ and their families. This funding will increase staffing capacity so FCSFL can better meet training and support service demands in this large rural four county area that currently has only one full-time LGBTQ Coordinator who is very overextended!

2022 SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS

The Gamma Mu Foundation Scholarship Committee recommended, and the Board approved, the following students to be awarded Scholarships for the Fall 2021-2022 term. The award amount is \$140,000 for 45 scholarships and includes 11 named scholarships for \$55,000 at \$5,000 each and includes 2 LGBT awards, and additional 34 awards at \$2,500 each for a total of \$85,000.

Cliff Pettit Fellow Program And Foundation Membership

The Cliff Pettit Fellow Program was established in 1989 as the major source of income for the newly created Gamma Mu Foundation. At that time, all members of Gamma Mu Fraternity were also members of the Foundation. In 1995 that arrangement was revised, limiting Foundation membership only to Cliff Pettit Fellows.

Becoming a Cliff Pettit Fellow requires a contribution to the Foundation of \$1,000, which can be lump-sum or accrued over time. Designation as a Cliff Pettit Fellow is permanent and provides for active Foundation membership for one year. After that time, an annual contribution to the Foundation is required to remain an Active Cliff Pettit Fellow and active member. At present, this amount is \$350.

The Cliff Pettit Fellow program and Foundation membership is open to any individual desiring to support the Foundation's mission.

Foundation membership entitles benefits including the right to vote for Directors and participate in decisions affecting the future of the Foundation. It also allows individuals to serve on all committees including grants and scholarships, thereby having a voice in how Foundation funds are dispersed.

Active Cliff Pettit Fellows are invited to attend the Foundation's annual summer retreat and participate in the Board's annual planning session in addition to the ability to serve on Foundation committees, vote on decisions that come before the annual meeting, and participate in the Foundation's future planning. They are also invited to attend "Active Fellows Only" gatherings held at select Fly-ins.

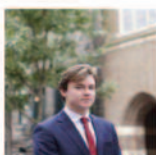

This year we had 184 qualifying applications, three less than last year. There were a total of 132 qualifying undergraduate and graduate applications. 81 (61% of gay (non-LGBT) applications) were undergraduates and 41 (39% of gay applications) were graduate applications. This year we awarded 30% of the total Gay applications received. We had 49 (down 64 from last year) LGBT qualifying applications this year to compete for two LGBT scholarships. This year we divided what was previously one LGBT process into two, undergraduate and graduate. We received 32 LGBT undergraduate and 17 LGBT graduate applications. One was awarded to an undergraduate and one was awarded to a graduate. After adding the Douglas Morton Scholarship this year, we have a total of 12 named scholarships. If we were to look at all four scholarship types, we funded 37 of 184 applications..
