LGBTQ Pride Month

The month of June was chosen for LGBTQ Pride Month to commemorate the riots held by members of the LGBTQ community against a police raid that took place at the Stonewall Inn in New York City on June 28, 1969.

The so-called Stonewall riots were a "tipping point" for the gay liberation movement in the United States, according to the Library of Congress. The uproar also paved the way for the modern fight for LGBTQ rights.

Pride Month events have drawn millions of participants from around the world each year. Typically, there are month-long celebrations and in-person gatherings that take place across the nation. Memorials are also often held for members of the LGBTQ community who have lost their lives to hate crimes or HIV/AIDS.

The rainbow LGBTQ flag is prominently displayed throughout the month.

Gilbert Baker, an American artist, gay rights activist and U.S. Army Veteran created the flag in 1978 as a new symbol for the gay and lesbian political movement at the suggestion of his friends and colleagues, including Harvey Milk, the first openly gay elected official in California. Milk was assassinated later that year. According to Baker's website, the colors of the LGBTQ flag each have a meaning: red for life, orange for healing, yellow for sunlight, green for nature, blue for harmony and violet for spirit.



THE IMPACT OF YOUR DONATIONS!

Death

On October 6, 1998, Shepard was tied to a fence, robbed, and tortured in a remote area outside Laramie, Wyoming. Shepard survived the initial attack but was not found until 18 hours later, and eventually succumbed to his injuries in a local hospital on October 12. He was 21 years old.

Days before he was pronounced dead, Shepard had already become a nationally mourned martyr, as information spread that his killers, Aaron McKinney and Russell Henderson, had targeted Shepard to rob because he was gay.

McKinney's attorney attempted a "gay panic" defense in court, claiming that Shepard's flirting with McKinney and Henderson in their car led to "temporary insanity," but the judge rejected the argument. (Henderson's lawyer, conversely, denied that Shepard's sexuality had any role in the crime at all.) Both McKinney and Henderson eventually received two consecutive life sentences in prison for the murder. In 2018, Shepard's ashes were interred at Washington, D.C.'s National Cathedral.

President Joe Biden, who oversaw the passage of the Matthew Shepard and James Byrd, Jr. Hate Crimes Prevention Act in 2009 as vice president, issued a <u>statement</u> on Thursday commemorating Shepard's death and called on Congress to finally pass the Equality Act, a landmark civil rights bill that would ban anti-LGBTQ+ discrimination but which has languished in Washington after <u>passing</u> through the House in 2019 and 2021.

"Matthew's tragic and senseless murder shook the conscience of the American people," Biden wrote. "And his courageous parents, Judy and Dennis Shepard, turned Matthew's memory into a movement, galvanizing millions of people to combat the scourge of anti-LGBTQI+hate and violence in America." Biden was referring to the Matthew Shepard Foundation, the nonprofit founded by Shepard's parents to spread their son's story and "foster a more caring and just world."

The Gamma Mu Foundation has supported the non-profit WYOMING EQUALITY for a number of years with their support to a statewide coalition of Pride and PFLAG organizations, amplifying their valuable work and offering a range of resources to help them grow.

Hate crimes have been going up across the board, but a new FBI report is shining light on a setting that's seen a particularly alarming rise in violence in recent years - schools and college campuses.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation findings show that elementary, secondary and university campuses accounted for 10 percent of all the hate crimes reporter in 1922.

In the same period, the most common victims of hate crime offenses at schools were Black students. The second most common targets were Jewish students, followed by LGBTQ+ students as the third most victimized group.

The data reflects the growing number of hate crimes in the United States, particularly against the LGBTQ+ community, while highlighting the role that educational institutions play in such incidents.

The latest FBI annual crime report, released in October 2023, found that LGBTQ+ hate crimes jumped by 19 percent in 2022 compared to the previous year. Kelley Robinson, president of the Human Rights Campaign, said in a statement that at the time that the data "serves as another alarming indicator of the state of emergency our community finds itself in."

ALSO YOUTH

SARASOTA AND MANATEE FLORIDA



ALSO Youth was created in 1992 by individuals who were alarmed at the statistics documenting high rates of suicide among gay and lesbian teens. In cooperation with other local organizations such as Parents, Families and Friends of Lesbians and Gays (PFLAG); Planned Parenthood; and YMCA Youth and Family Services, volunteers were recruited to conduct a support group for Sarasota area youth. Upon realizing that more comprehensive services were needed throughout the community, ALSO's founders

initiated contact with school officials and implemented a training program for educators. The types of services and numbers of youth and community members served have steadily increased.

Today, ALSO Youth is a non-profit organization providing peer support services, community enrichment, scholarships, free counseling, and so much more for LGBTQ+ youth ages 10 to 24, their families and friends, and the community.

The organization has "Drop -In" centers in Sarasota and Manatee Florida that offer a parent support group, art-centered support programs, movie nights, book club with free books.

The Gamma Mu Foundation awarded a \$15,000. Grant to ALSO YOUTH this current Grant cycle.
